
Winter Youth Education

Growing edible crops at high elevation is undoubtedly a challenge. Here at the Arboretum, we have seen incredible years of abundance, as well as tragic years full of extreme temperature fluctuations and drought. Regardless of obstacles, gardeners in Northern Arizona persist, adapting like the plants, and carrying forward with dreams of overflowing harvest baskets.

We at the Arboretum have a unique opportunity to not only inspire our community, but educate them on how to be successful in the vegetable

garden. We utilize our 200-acres to increase understanding and appreciation for the place we live, and take pride in teaching people how to create oases in their own yards. With that, we are in need of building supplies to create wind-breaks and season extenders like frost cloth for those freezing June and August nights. We also need funding for seeds to increase the variety of cold adapted edibles. With this, we can show our visitors, volunteers, and students that vegetable gardening at 7,000 ft is possible.

We have partnered with SeedMoney for this campaign. In addition to keeping 100% of the funds we raise from individuals like you, we have a chance to win a challenge grant of up to \$1,000 from SeedMoney based on how much we raise over the course of the 30-day period ending on December 15th. Right now, you may be thinking, "What will the neighbors think? It's the end of the season, we've even gotten some snow, and now all my plants are brown and dead-looking!" It's that time of the year you may be wondering, do I cut back all the perennials and annuals or leave them over the winter?

Some plants, like grasses and our native yarrow actually look amazing when dormant! That's right, maybe you can cut some of your plants back but keep others for their aesthetic value. At the same time, you could support wildlife and leave all your dead and dormant plants just as they are. What you'll end up seeing is critter tracks in the snow and birds chirping and jumping between the plants, loving the habitat your plants provide.

Keeping your garden wild this time of year is my favorite thing to do for two other reasons:

- 1. You're tired. It was a long season. Why not keep those cutbacks in the garden for when you get that gardening itch in the spring but it's stilllll too early to plant!
- 2. Leaving the plants with seedheads as they allow the seeds to fully develop and drop. Thus, free plants! And free seeds for the chipmunks and birds to eat.

Whatever you do with your cutbacks this fall, I hope you enjoy the last days of gardening for the season!
